A Resolution On The True State of The State of West Virginia

The Constitution of West Virginia is the supreme law of the state during both peace and wartime.

The 10th Amendment of the Bill of Rights states that all powers other than specifically enumerated powers granted by the people to the Federal Government are powers of the individual states and the people themselves.

Government is of, by, and for the people. It is their right and duty to see that government remain of, by, and for the people.

The federal government has overstepped its authority in numerous ways.

A few examples are:

1. Using the IRS through incorporation of churches to control churches thus violating the first amendment. This is also in direct violation of Article 6 Section 47 of the West Virginia Constitution
2. Nationalizing the state's guards for military purposes.

3. Exercising authority and powers in the sovereign states when the U.S. Constitution limits this authority and powers to the District of Columbia and U.S. Territories.

It is the responsibility of the people to see that their elected and appointed representatives who have taken an oath to abide by the West Virginia and United States Constitutions live up to and execute their responsibilities in protecting our state and country. The rule of law is paramount.
